
## <u>Podium Protest</u>

The world as we know it today, where people can live in harmony alongside each other, has only been a recent thing. Until the last few decades, people all over the world have experienced discrimination because of the colour of their skin or their race. One such place where discrimination has happened for a very long time is in the United States of America (USA).

America has a long history of racial inequality. Although there were 4.8 million black people in the United States in 1870, they were underrepresented, oppressed and were treat like a second class citizen. Even in 1865 when slavery was abolished, the quality of life for a black person was worse than for a white person. More recently, in 2007, it was reported that there was 40.7 million black or mixed race people living in the USA, and rights have drastically improved since the 1800s. This was a long journey for Americans though, and did not happen overnight. In fact most advancements of black equality have happened recently.

In 1965, a law was finally passed in the USA that meant that a black American could now vote. Although times were changing, black people still lived in poor conditions. Firstly, people were divided into three main groups. You were either *white, black* or *coloured* (mixed race). You were given an identity card saying which group you belonged to. In 1959, a new group was added called *Asians*; again you had to carry an ID card to say which group you belonged to. The law also said that different racial groups could not mix. For example, if you were black and your friend was white, you were not allowed to meet up in public and hang out.



## A Stand; A Silent Protest

In 1968, a professor who worked for the Olympic Project for Human Rights, wanted black athletes to boycott the Olympic Games. Two black American athletes, Tommie Smith and John Carlos, attended the games and won gold and bronze medals respectively, for their running event. When they were invited up onto the podium to collect their medals, they made a silent protest. All the way through the American anthem they held their fists in the air, with a gloved hand. They had their heads down and nothing on their feet. They both also wore human rights badges on their jackets. The world, who was watching the Olympic Games, were forced to listen, if only for a brief time. This was called the Black Power Salute. The other

athlete on the podium was Australian athlete Peter Norman. He knew that the protest was going to happen and joined in by wearing a human rights badge to show his support. Peter Norman wanted to join in because he hated the White Australia Policy that would exclude certain groups from Australia. Subsequently, they were booed off the podium by the crowd.

The International Olympic Committee (IOC) were mad with the men. They did not want politics brought to the event. They demanded that Smith and Carlos be banned from competing, but the US Olympic Committee refused. Eventually, Smith and Carlos were banned because the IOC threatened the US team; no runners could compete unless the two men were banned from running. Peter Norman was also banned by his country, Australia, for his part in the protest.

After the 1968 Olympic Games, Smith and Carlos were criticised by the American sports groups. When the two men got back home, they and their families experienced hate crimes and even death threats! They both experienced hard times in their careers after the protest. They were only recognised for their efforts in 2008, 40 years after making their point to the world! They were awarded an Arthur Ashe Courage Award at the 2008 ESPY (Excellence in Sports Performance Yearly) Awards honouring their action at the 1968 games.

There are many statues of Tommie Smith and John Carlos around the world now to celebrate their protest and thank them for what they risked in order to get people thinking about the rights of black athletes.

What can be done to prevent race discrimination? Many countries are making huge efforts to change their ways and promote race equality. October is Black History Month, where schools, colleges and the media will focus on the achievements of black people throughout time, as well as focusing on how to challenge discrimination. Black History Month started in America in 1926 and lasted a week; now many countries all over the world hold some form of Black History Day or Month.


