## Pandora's Box Teacher Questions

What does Prometheus tell humans they must do? (AF2) **That they must always obey and respect the gods.**

Describe in your own words how the Earth was for Man at the beginning. (AF3) **It was a place of peace and harmony.**

**People lived happily with no worries. It was perfect.**

Why did Zeus decide to take fire from Man? (AF2) **He was cross with Man because they had accepted the gift of fire from the giant Prometheus, who had stolen it from the Gods - the beams of the sun.**

Why was fire so important to humans? (AF3) **It is important to humans because it is a heat source and allows them to cook and therefore eat, is a source of warmth and allows them to mould and make tools made of metal which are used to cultivate the fields and grow crops.**

What do you think "the final straw" means? (AF5) **When a series of unacceptable or bad events continue to occur and which finally means you can no longer continue to accept.**

What does immortal mean? Why did this prove to be a problem for Prometheus? (AF2/AF3) **Everlasting, will never die. He endures continual suffering. Every day, chained to a rock, Prometheus' liver was clawed out by a vulture and he was in constant pain. He did not die due to his immortality so the process would repeat itself every day.**

"Her curiosity knew no bounds." What does this mean? (AF5) **She would stop at nothing to find out what was inside the jar. Her inquisitiveness was unstoppable.**

Find the simile in this text. What do you think it means? (AF4) **"As white as a sheet." Go very pale due to shock, fear or illness.**

Why do you think the word NEVER is in capital letters? (AF5) **To add emphasis and importance to the statement being said. It is relevant to the story.**

Why do Pandora's eyes twinkle and her fingers twitch? (AF3) **She is tempted and has a strong desire to open the box. The urge to see what's inside makes her eyes sparkle with delight at the thought of what the box contains. Her fingers twitch as she finds it hard to restrain herself from opening the box.**

From what you have read about Epimetheus, how would you describe his personality? (AF3) **He is foolish and is easily persuaded. He lacks foresight in that he falls for Pandora's superficial beauty and is not a good judge of character. He is weak and allows Pandora to control and boss him.**

Epimetheus is captivated by Pandora. What does this mean? (AF2) **He is spellbound and attracted by her beauty. He is overwhelmingly attracted to her.**

"She would open it." Why do you think this line stands alone? (AF5) **The author writes this on one line to emphasis the importance of these words and the outcome of opening the box. With Pandora opening the box this has major consequences for all of Earth.**

Why do you think the author uses the words, "buzzed, hissed and moaned" to describe what comes out of the jar? Think of some other words to describe the sounds that are made when the lid is lifted. (AF6)

**It makes the bad things that are discharged have a "personality" and are like living things, creating distressing and troubling noises.**

**Shrill, piercing, squawking, tormented, groaning, wailing.**

Why does the story end with one word, on one line, in capital letters? (AF4) **It is to emphasise that out of the misery and horror at what Pandora has done by releasing evil and suffering into the world, there is a glimmer of light. All is not lost and this is very important. There is some positive to come out of a dreadful action/situation.**

What is the moral of this story? (AF7) **That you should listen to warnings.**

**Do not be tempted by something or be greedy as this may have consequences.**

**It explains why there can be evil, suffering and bad things in the world but out of this despair there is always hope and faith.**
